Lent – a good time to deepen your prayer life

Lent is a time to take stock of ourselves spiritually. This includes setting aside extra time for prayer. Here are some helpful things to remember as you settle down to it:

People have been praying since Adam had a grandson named Enosh. The Bible tells us (Genesis 4:26) that it was during his days when 'men began to call on the name of the Lord'. They have been doing it ever since.

People have had their prayers answered by God since Genesis, too. But if you want to read some beautiful prayers – and answers to them, browse through the Psalms. Again and again the psalmist writes: "the Lord heard my cry".

So – what do you need to bring to prayer? Just the tiniest amount of faith that God is even there. Jesus assures us that even faith as big as a tiny mustard seed will be effective.

What gives you the right to come before Almighty God? Jesus does. The Bible is clear that "there is one mediator between God and men, the man Jesus Christ". (1 Timothy 2:5)

The Bible makes clear that God does not stand on ceremony – in fact, He prefers our personal, spontaneous prayers. Jesus was very matter of fact about it: "When you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you." (Matthew 6:6)

The Bible assures us that prayer will bring us good things: "we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need". (Hebrews 4:16)

Above all, prayer must be made with a pure heart. "If I had cherished sin in my heart, the Lord would not have listened." (Psalm 66:18) That simply means that if you know you are doing something wrong, and intend to keep right on doing it, don't waste your time praying.

Finally, what can be the results of your prayers this Lent? Well, here are seven, for starters...

Joy and deep happiness. (John 16:24)

Relief from your worry, stress and tension (Philippians 4:6,7)

Wisdom and more mental clarity (James 1:5,6)

Protection and deliverance from temptations (Matthew 26:41)

An ability to share the Good News of Jesus to other people (Matthew 9:38)

Strength to persevere when you feel under spiritual attack (Ephesians 6:18)

A growing thankfulness to God, who is worthy of all glory (Revelation 4:11)

So, what happens when you pray?

Say you were to pray for a chance to share the hope of Jesus with young people who are at a tricky stage in life....what would you expect God to do? He might ask you to put your money and time where your mouth is. He might ask you to step out and push a couple of doors.

So how might one use the Eden Bus, to forge links with Secondary School youngsters in Hollingworth? (The bus, a high tech playground that invites youngsters to unwind together after school and offers an opportunity to speak of a God who is besotted by them)...and the bus was available.

What about funding?...and it was offered.

Helpers were needed to pray and commit to this vision...and people responded from local churches.

God then provided a place to park the bus...with the help of a kind pub landlord.

He brought the young people along that he had in his heart before He had given the vision!

This is our God. This is how he responds when His visions become ours.

After a year, what has happened?

We have come to know those young people quite well since that start, at the beginning of 2019. We have found some bits quite tricky, as we've tried to find ways to share our faith in the midst of chaotic fun!

God is growing us, as he is growing our new young friends.

We moved after 10 fantastic weeks on the bus with our new Eden friend, John, into St Mary's Church. Would these young people be prepared to trade a state-of-the-art activity bus for a church hall?

Of course!...God has a work to do.

God has reached out, and a number of the young people have taken a tentative step towards him... can't tell you how exciting that is to see!

We have met 85 young people over the past year. Each week we have spent with between 6 and 25 youngsters.

What a privilege to be a part of God's plan in whatever we take on in His name!

Do you think you might be able to help us in being Jesus to young people in Hollingworth? We would really appreciate your help. We would value your prayers for the young people, and that we would be able to follow God's leading faithfully.

If you feel that God might be stirring your heart to share Him with these young people, then speak to Bruce Perrin to find out more. You might share Him by making toast and drinks, or playing pool, or doing crafts...and through the conversations that come out of those things.

The work that God has been doing in your life is a powerful testimony to others, so why not share it?






World Day of Prayer

If you have a pension age concessionary pass, to continue to benefit from unlimited off peak travel on trains and trams in Greater Manchester after 1st February 2020, you will need to pay an annual fee of £10. There is no charge if you only use the bus. The £10 does not apply to people with a disabled pass. You can apply to any TFGM Travel Shop, or Pay Point Shop (One Stop) from 25th January. 
Pancake Party



Church notices that didn't quite get it right!






The Real Easter Egg 10th anniversary edition



The Real Easter Egg was launched in 2010 but the supermarkets turned down the idea at first. It was left to churches and church schools to place orders to fund The Meaningful Chocolate Company to make The Real Easter Egg.

Ten years on, more than a million eggs have been sold with over 750,000 sent through the post directly to churches and schools. The rest have been sold through retailers and supermarkets.

The success of The Real Easter Egg has meant that the production of Fairtrade chocolate has moved to the UK. Over £275,000 has been raised from sales for charitable causes.

Out of the 80 million Easter eggs sold in this part of the world every year, The Real Easter Egg is the only one which has a copy of the Easter story in

the box, is made of Fairtrade chocolate and which supports charitable projects.

The Original and Dark eggs include a 24 page Easter story-activity book. The Dark also contains a simple Easter guide, designed for adults and 3 dark Mini Squares. The Fun Pack has an Easter story activity poster and 6 milk chocolate eggs. The Special Edition has a Bethlehem olive wood cross keyring, a simple guide to Easter, an orange milk chocolate bar and a luxury milk chocolate egg.

Who's for pancakes?

Why do we have pancakes on Shrove Tuesday, or Pancake Day, as we call it today? And what is Shrove Tuesday? And why do thousands of people feel it rewarding to race along a street somewhere tossing pancakes from their frying pans as they go?

Well, the answer to the first question is that it is the day before Lent begins and for well over a thousand years that has meant it was the last chance to enjoy meat, fat and other tasty dishes until Easter Day. The 'Lent Fast' was widely and strictly observed. The food in the larder wouldn't keep for six weeks so it had to be eaten. With all these rich foods no wonder the French call it 'Fatty Tuesday' – Mardi Gras.

So, what have pancake races got to do with all this solemnity? 'Shrove' is an old word for 'forgiven' and in those days to prepare for the rigours of Lent people would want to confess

and seek forgiveness – not quite what you want at a party. The answer is quite simply enjoying yourself while you can! So, on Shrove Tuesday this year let's have some fun and make it last as long as possible.

The most convincing (and amusing) of the explanations of pancake races is of outwitting the Sexton who rang the curfew bell that marked the start of Lent. He was reluctant to do it while the race was unfinished. So, the revelry caused by dropped pancakes, postponed the inevitable.

Since the Reformation it has not been so rigorously observed in Britain, but still people will resolve to 'give up something for Lent'. Six weeks is about right as a duration and Sunday has always been exempt but make the most of those pancakes. They may well not reappear until April 12th!
